Cleveland Hopkins International Airport (CLE) has awarded a contract through a bidding process to Baumann Enterprises, Inc., to demolish the former Sheraton Hotel building on airport grounds.

Airport Sheraton Hotel to be Demolished in

Coming Months

The hotel, which was built in 1959, has been closed since June of 2022. Short-term, the site will be turned into surface parking to add to the on-site parking inventory for CLE. The hotel itself had nearly 500 spots that the airport has been utilizing since acquiring the building.

When it was built, the hotel was a popular layover location for passengers and airline crews for overnight stays, particularly when there were weather related flight delays and cancellations. Originally, there were 60 rooms; the hotel expanded to 243 rooms in 1972. The decision was made to demolish the building due to the condition and the lack

of demand for an on-site hotel.

vehicle, head-on collision at Route 237 and Eastland Rd. When they arrived they found "two of the most badly damaged vehicles that first responders ever see." Each had a critical patient, one of which needed to be extricated.

"I'm not sure how your crew knew about the accident, but an ARFF ambulance and pumper arrived on scene very shortly after our crew and took charge of one of the patients," said Brook Park Fire Chief Mark T. Higgins. "Their assistance allowed our members to stay focused on using our extrication tools to provide

access to and ultimately remove the other patient quickly."

On July 27th, the Brook Park Fire Department responded to a high speed, two-


